As we bid farewell to 2023, I am thrilled to share with you the remarkable progress and achievements of the Baton Rouge Fire Department. Throughout the year, our dedicated team has relentlessly worked to enhance our services and ensure the safety of our community.

One of the highlights of 2023 was the addition of 49 new members to our department, bolstering the ranks of Firefighters and Fire Communications personnel. Presently, we are proud to have 561 employees devoted to serving the citizens of Baton Rouge.

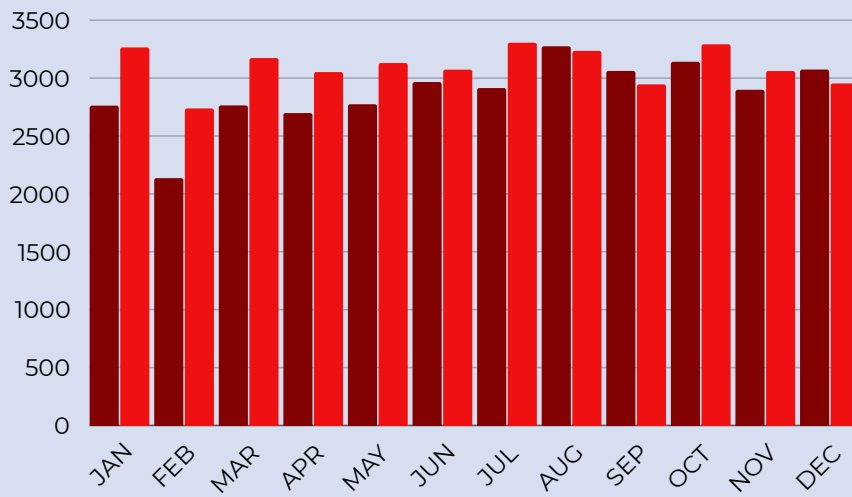

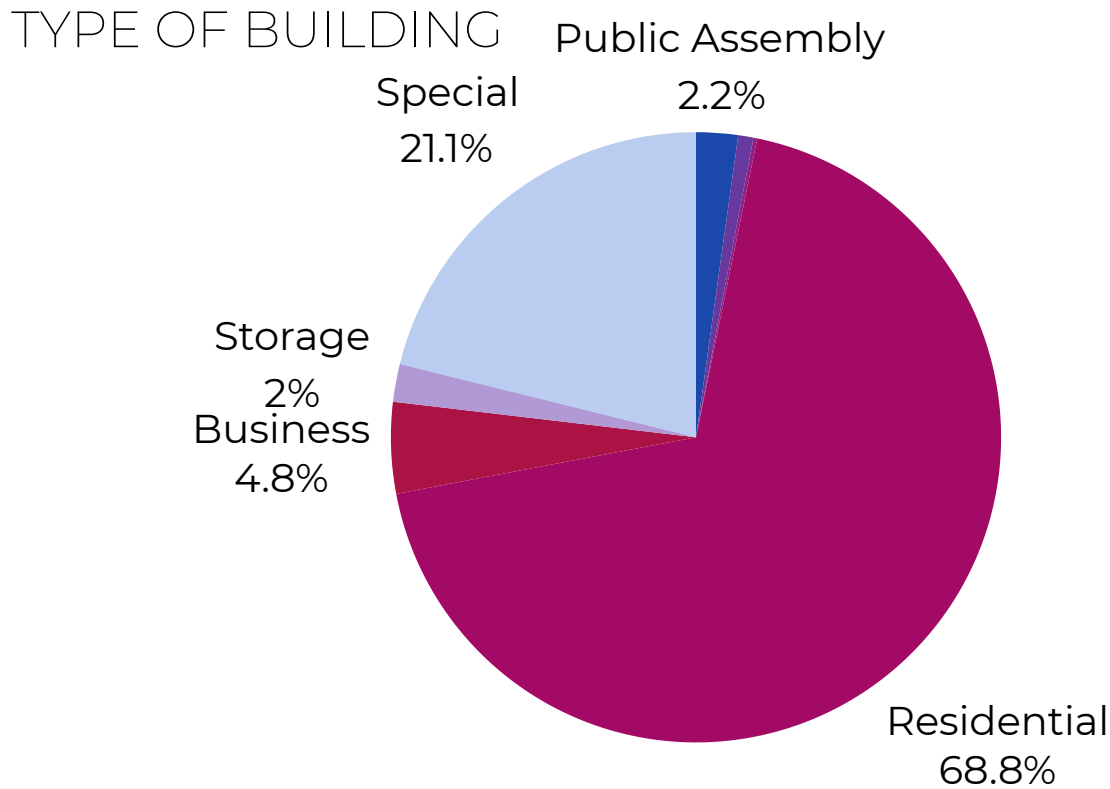

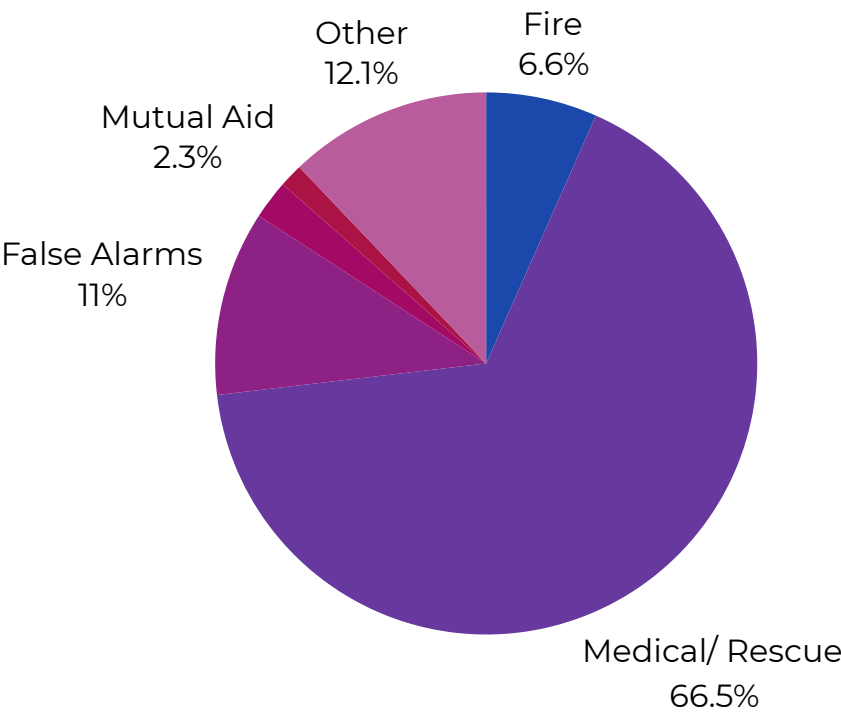

FIRE SAFETY DIVISION

The responsibility for seeing that all fire department personnel follow proper safety procedures belongs to the Fire Safety Division under the direction of the chief fire safety officer and four (4) fire safety officers. This division investigates all injuries or accidents involving personnel or equipment of the Baton Rouge Fire Department. The Fire Safety Division also maintains records about injuries/ illness of personnel and works with other fire department divisions in conducting safety programs.

The Fire Safety Division is responsible for gathering and investigating all infectious/ contagious disease exposures to the Baton Rouge Fire Department personnel.

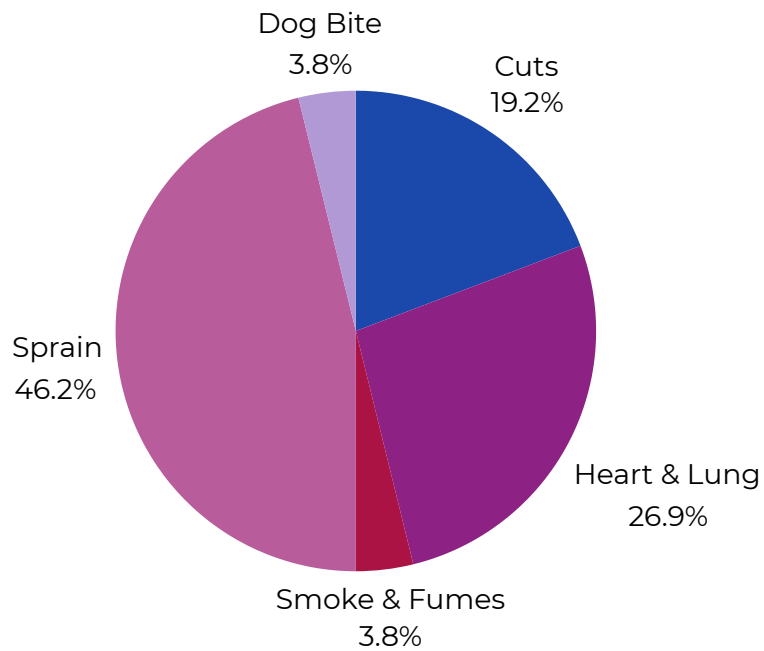

The Special Services Division coordinates the activities and recordkeeping of the mechanic shop, the supply room, the building maintenance shop, and fire equipment. This division keeps the fire department running physically. This division also acts as a liaison between the BRFD and all other East Baton Rouge Parish fire departments. Responsibilities for each section of the Special Services Division are listed below.



Mechanic Shop- Manage all firefighting apparatus, vehicles, and equipment. They also preserve adequate parts supplies and records for adequately utilizing the shop.

Fire Equipment- Responsible for the regular inspection of all ground ladders used for rescue, firefighting operations, and training; perform repairs of fire department nozzles, including turbo-jet nozzle assemblies and straight stream nozzles assemblies; disassembles equipment, repairs or replaces damaged parts and tests equipment; responsible for issuing or repairing firefighting hose and conducting flow test. They are also responsible for the upkeep of all tools and equipment necessary to perform assigned maintenance and repair; maintain storage of replacement parts.

Building Maintenance Shop- Responsible for maintenance and upkeep of all fire department buildings. This upkeep includes painting, floor installation, cabinet and locker repair and construction, furniture repair, door and window glass replacement, overhead door adjustments, roof repairs, plumbing, and HVAC repair.

Supply Room- Responsible for storekeeping, proper receipt, storage, and distribution of the materials and supplies for the department.

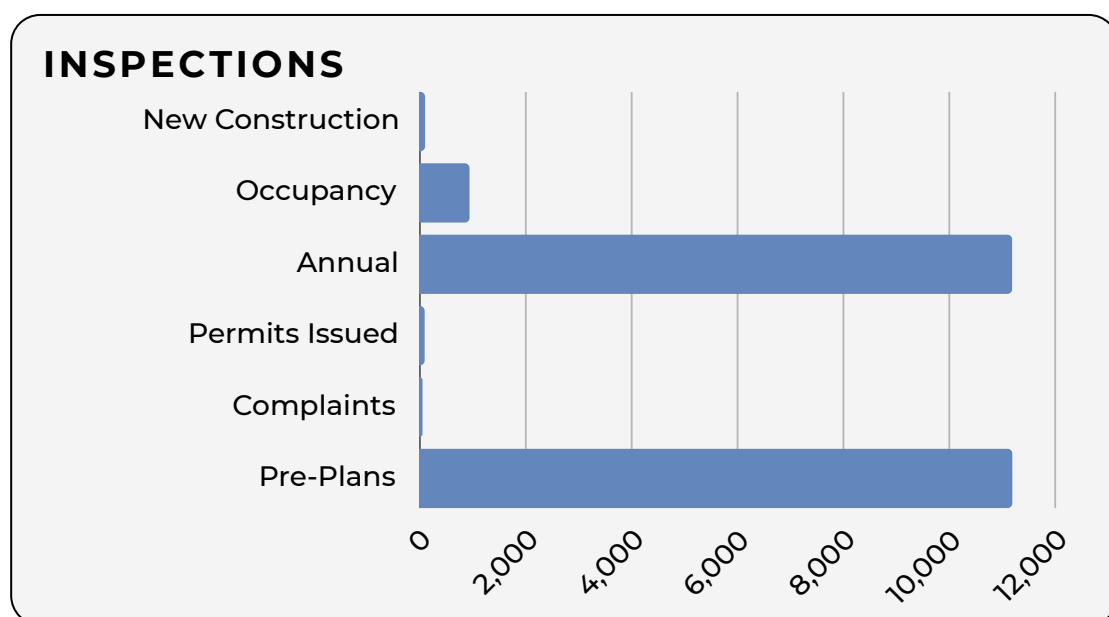

The Fire Prevention Bureau is the inspections and education division of the Baton Rouge Fire Department. This division's job and responsibility is to enforce fire codes and regulations, inspect and abate existing and potential fire hazards, and recommend fire prevention standards. The duty of this division is to prevent incidents that require the response of our fire suppression personnel.

The Prevention Bureau is also a part of the City-Parish permitting and inspections process for commercial properties in the city limits of Baton Rouge. As a part of this process, we inspect new construction, renovations, additions, and occupancies.



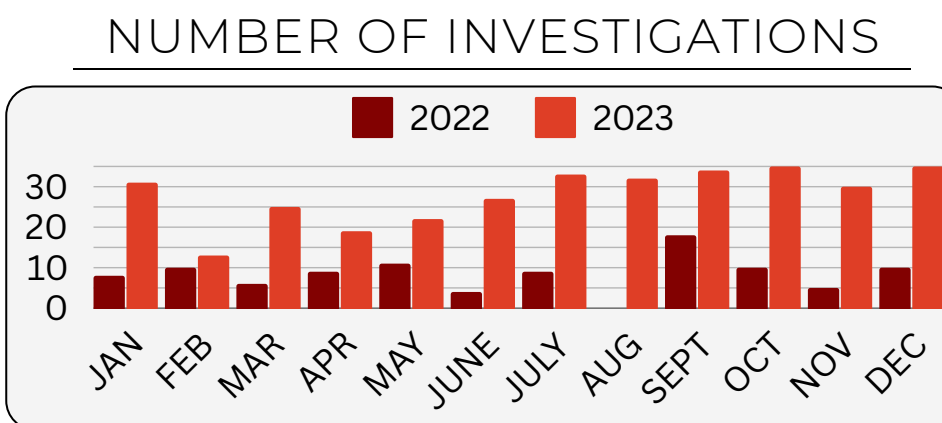
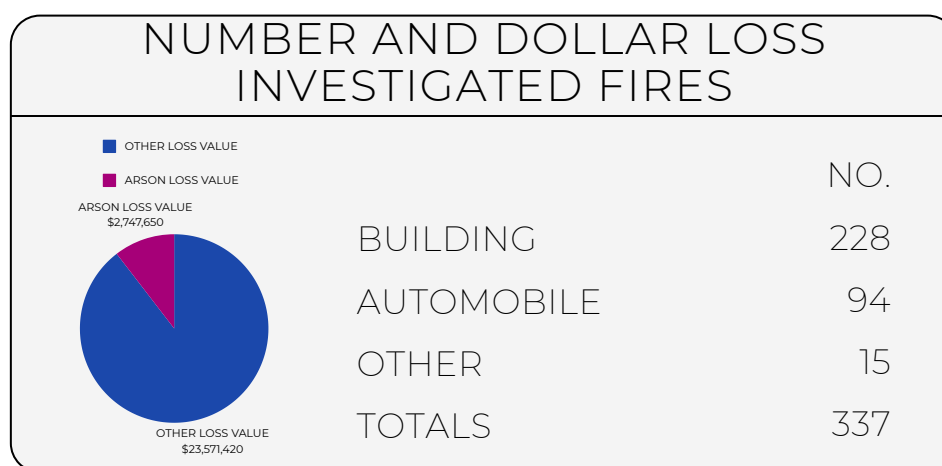
This division also conducts year-round fire safety education programs for the general public, schools, hospitals, industry, businesses, and civic and fraternal organizations. They make use of their Fire Safety House, which is a valuable educational tool. It teaches children, as well as adults, the importance of fire safety in the home. In addition to the Fire Safety House, we have Patches the Fire Dog Robot. Patches is an excellent tool for educating younger children about fire safety.

This division is responsible for investigating all fires with a suspicious or undetermined cause and origin and where a fire death has occurred. They also work with other law enforcement agencies dealing with arson.

The overall goal of this division is to conduct responsible investigations to determine the cause, origin, and circumstances of each fire, including loss of life and/or injury or by which property has been destroyed or damaged. They intend to determine if the fire cause results from carelessness or design.

They investigate all suspicious fires from the time of inception to the time of prosecution.

The investigators collect the evidence, arrest the suspect, and make the court appearance. Hopefully, these efforts will lead to the conviction of the arsonist.

The Hazardous Materials Division is responsible for coordinating the response resources of the city and parish emergency services in the event of an incident involving hazardous materials.

By definition, a hazardous material is any substance in a quantity or form which may be harmful or injurious to humans, domestic animals, wildlife, economic crops, or property when released into the environment. Many hazardous substances are manufactured or transported within this parish daily. Thus, maintaining a well-equipped and professional hazardous materials team for the Baton Rouge Fire Department is essential.

The Hazardous Materials Division consists of twelve (12) personnel:

- 1 Hazardous Materials Chief
- 1 Assistant Hazardous Materials Chief
- 1 Fire Records Clerk
- 9 Hazardous Materials Officers

The primary responsibility of the Hazmat Division is the response and mitigation of emergencies involving (or potentially involving) chemicals. Other responsibilities include training, planning, and exercising with public and private agencies for chemical emergencies. One crucial activity supporting the division's goal is managing the Baton Rouge Area Mutual Aid System (BRAMAS). This organization comprises paying members from the eight parishes within the Baton Rouge Area and facilitates the cooperation of these entities so they can support each other during emergencies. The hazardous materials officers staff a response unit (Unit 96) that responds parish-wide.

In 2023, they responded to 495 incidents involving chemical releases with products with the following hazards:

- Explosives
- Compressed Gases
- Flammable Liquids
- Water-Reactive Products
- Oxidizers
- Poisons
- Radioactive Products
- Corrosive Liquids
- Miscellaneous or Unknown

The division received numerous notifications from area industrial sites involving situations or incidents that could affect the public: these may include but are not limited to, chemical spills, fires, medical emergencies, flaring, training, and drills.

The division also participates with the Local Emergency Planning Committee, The Baton Rouge Area Mutual Aid System, and the North Baton Rouge Chemical Industry Task Force monthly in meetings to plan activities that make Baton Rouge Less vulnerable to and more prepared for chemical emergencies.

COMMUNICATIONS DIVISION

The Communications Division is housed in the communications center at the Mayor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness.

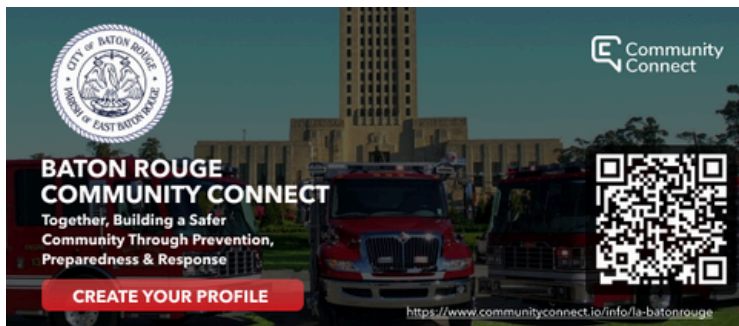


Twenty-two (22) fire department personnel work in fire communications. Twenty (20) of the personnel comprise four rotating shifts keeping the center operating on a 24-hour basis. The chief and assistant chief fire communications officers supervise the division and work straight days.

The division is responsible for the dispatching, tracking, and notification of emergency calls to city fire units. This division also assists in dispatch for five (5) parish departments. The 2023 total number of incidents dispatched was 34,465.

INFORMATION AND TECHNOLOGY

The Information and Technology Specialist position is a pivotal role. Key responsibilities include the upkeep, programming, security, and troubleshooting of the department's computer and network infrastructure and associated equipment. Additionally, individuals in this role manage the computerized records management system's maintenance and promptly address users' requests regarding computer, networking, or technological issues. This position operates with moderate supervision, with the fire chief overseeing and reviewing the work.



This position played a crucial role in the successful launch of Community Connect, an innovative program designed to enhance emergency response effectiveness. Through Community Connect, residents and businesses have the

opportunity to upload vital information that can aid firefighters in swiftly and accurately responding to emergencies at their addresses. This initiative fosters a proactive approach to emergency preparedness by empowering community members to share critical details about their properties, such as floor plans, utility shutoff locations, and special considerations for occupants.

By collaborating closely with stakeholders and leveraging technological expertise, the Information and Technology Specialist ensured the seamless implementation and ongoing support of Community Connect, thereby strengthening the overall safety and resilience of the Baton Rouge community.

FIRE SUPPRESSION

The Fire Suppression Division is the fire department's actual "firefighting" aspect. This division consists of three (3) shifts- A (Red Shift), B (Black Shift), and C (Green Shift). An assistant fire chief maintains their shift operations through seven (7) district fire chiefs. The district fire chiefs supervise the operations of the nineteen (19) fire stations throughout the city. These fire stations are divided into five (5) fire districts and staffed by assigned fire captains, fire equipment operators, and firefighters.

The deputy fire chiefs work straight days, with one deputy chief responsible for each of the following aspects of fire suppression:

- Assign work schedules and approve leaves
- Manage suppression of working fires
- Inspect the appearance of assigned equipment, buildings, and personnel

The Fire Suppression Division is the most visible part of the fire department. The members of this division are in the public's eye as they respond to fires, automobile accidents, first aid calls, etc.
